	Scullers/steers/coxes proposed for Level 3 will be required to pass a test on knowledge of the Tideway Code and on the key hazards encountered on the Tideway between Putney Bridge and Richmond Lock.

Notes:

- 1. The skills required to manage single and double sculls are considered to be equivalent and therefore covered in a single sign-off assessment.
- 2. Steering of a 4x- presents the challenge of a faster and longer boat as well as use of a footplate driven rudder and therefore subject to a separate assessment.
- 3. Steering of sweep boats provide a further level of skill and are deemed to require a separate assessment. [However, a steer signed off for 4- is deemed to be signed off also for 4x-.]
- 4. The Rowing Safety Advisor will maintain a register of sign off levels for all TWRC members. If you have any questions on your status, please ask either the Captains or the Rowing Safety Advisor.

- Wind speed of >35 km/hr or gusts of >50 km/hr
- Flow rate of >100 m³/s after adjusting for the effect of tidal flow (see the boating plan for details)
- Darkness or reduced visibility of 100-180 metres.
