EMERGENCY ACTION PLAN

THIS DOCUMENT COMPRISES THREE PARTS: EMERGENCY INFORMATION INCLUDING THE CONTACTS FOR KEY PEOPLE AND SERVICES REQUIRED IN EMERGENCY, SITE LAYOUT AND EMERGENCY SERVICE ACCESS POINTS. SECONDLY THERE IS A DETAILED INCIDENT PROCEDURE COVERING THE PROCEDURES FOR DEALING WITH ANY MAJOR INCIDENT REQUIRING ATTENDANCE OF EMERBGENCY SERVICES AND THIRDLY THE CANCELLATION & POSTPONEMENT PROCEDURE.



EVACUATION PLAN FOR HAM HOUSE CAR PARK & SITE CARE AT RIVER LANE Ham Road Car Park – Regatta Enclosure

In the Event of a major incident or change of conditions the following procedures should be followed:

- Officials in the finish tent to advise all stations to listen to instructions and to try and minimise any other radio traffic. The commentator using the main PA system will warn all competitors and spectators of the danger.
- All races will stop and no boats will be allowed to take to the water at River Lane. Boats on the water will be asked to get off the water at River Lane. This will be controlled by umpires afloat.
- The member of the Organising Committee located in the finish area will notify the relevant emergency services and inform the St John Ambulance personal of the situation.
- Officials will be asked to assist in getting spectators out of the Regatta Enclosure by the nearest, safe, exit.
- Once the Regatta Enclosure is clear, officials will be positioned at the exits to prevent competitors and spectators from re-entering.
- As soon as the emergency services arrive, control of the situation will pass to the relevant officer.

MAJOR INCIDENT PROCEDURE

INTRODUCTION

The Regatta Chair (Danny Fitzgerald), the Race Committee Chair (Mark Vellacott) and the Safety Officer (Tony Alves) are responsible for the operation of this procedure and can declare a 'major incident', at which point this procedure applies. They should at all times do what makes sense in terms of making and communicating decisions.

A major incident is one that may affect racing and/or involves the emergency services

(this does not mean that all events that affect racing are major incidents)

Examples:

- Medical emergency on or near the course involving threat to life
- Fire or explosion near the course or in a busy area
- Civil unrest or other intrusion on the Regatta

(this does not mean that all events that may effect racing are major incidents)

Actions they can take include:

Manage the situation using the Regatta's own resources, whilst racing continues

Suspend or change the racing programme whilst the situation is dealt with

Call in appropriate emergency services (fire & rescue, ambulance, police)

In doing so they should follow these basic steps:

Incident Control: establish a clear line of command, with one senior official coordinating the incident response and liaising with the emergency services.

Access: manage the area around the incident to ensure it can be dealt with quickly and effectively, including access routes for emergency services.

Competition: if racing is affected or suspended, another senior official leads decisions on how to resume or amend the racing programme, and ensure any competitors left afloat are looked after.

Communicate: ensure all relevant people are informed quickly about the decisions made, and confirm that key people (e.g. Registration, Control, Start) have received the message.

Common considerations

- Maintain a detailed log of the incident (who, what, when, where).
- If you call the emergency services, let them take charge of the incident and follow their advice or instructions. Support them and don't tell them what to do.
- Deploy officials (spare umpires) on crowd control, and to ensure unobstructed access for emergency services. Remember several vehicles may attend.
- Actively manage competitors on the water and officials on duty. If necessary arrange transport to recover them and to return them later.
- If racing is suspended, take a realistic view of how and when it can resume. Use the down-time to plan options. Allow enough time for people to get back into place.
- Agree in advance some principles for deciding whether to resume racing in the event of a death.
- Communicate decisions effectively but concisely. Don't keep a running commentary of the incident.
- Do not reveal personal information on the radio net: use mobile phones to communicate.
- Check on the welfare of anyone affected by the incident (e.g. friends or relatives). Define an official to find them and support them as necessary.

In event of a cardiac arrest

- In event of a cardiac arrest suffered by a competitor while racing, the Umpire should immediately halt racing and summon an ambulance.
- The nearest safety boat is to transport the casualty to the boating area where first aid is in attendance pending arrival of an ambulance. Whether the casualty is transferred onto the safety boat or towed to the boating area is to be based on an assessment of the quickest way to access medical attention.
- Defibrillators are available at First Aid at the Boating area and at the Regatta Enclosure.

CANCELLATION & POSTPONEMENT PROCEDURE

INTRODUCTION

The Race Committee Chair (Mark Vellacott), the Regatta Chair (Danny Firzgerald) and the Safety Advisor (Tony Alves) are responsible for the operation of this procedure and should constantly monitor racing conditions. They should at all times do what makes sense in terms of making and communicating decisions. When making substantive decisions they should meet in person if possible; in extreme circumstances they can do so by radio or mobile phone.

Cancellation or postponement may arise from, for example:

- · Steadily worsening weather resulting in unsafe or unfair racing
- Temporary weather crisis such as a thunderstorm or squall
- Major incidents such as an accident (on water or on land) or a security alert

Actions they can take include:

Change the course: shorten the course at the Start or Finish

Change the timetable: run later or potentially cancel some races

Change the draw:

In doing so they should follow these basic steps:

Evaluate: actively gather data in person or from relevant people (e.g. umpires & regatta officials) in order to make well-informed decisions, concentrating on facts rather than opinions.

Decide: consider all reasonable actions in the circumstances, then select those that are in the best interests of the safety of competitors and officials, and of fair racing.

Communicate: ensure all relevant people are informed quickly about the decisions made and confirm that key people (e.g. Registration, Regatta Control, the Start) have received and understood the message.

Common considerations:

- Speed is of the essence. It may be best to suspend racing immediately for, say, 30 minutes to allow proper consideration of timetable, draw or other major changes. A full decision can then be made and announced later.
- It's often wise to stop crews boating immediately even if firm decisions have yet to be made.
- In worsening weather, racing should be suspended when conditions become unfair, rather than waiting until they are unsafe.
- The quickest way to clear competitors from the course would mainly be from the boating area but for crews near the finish it may be quicker to have them row up to Twickenham Rowing Club.
- Officials and stakeboat volunteers may need attention as well as competitors.
- There are well-established guidelines on actions in the event of a thunderstorm.
